The National Digital Stewardship Alliance Innovation Working Group awards team is excited to announce the 2013 winners of the [NDSA Innovation Awards](#). Moving on Up: New Web Archives Presentation Home



We're excited to finally announce something a team of Library staff has been involved with for over a year now – a big project to integrate the Library's web archives into the rest of the loc.gov web presence. It's the new "[Archived Web Site](#)" format type and is a part of the Library's main search function.

This update provides, for the first time, a way for the Library's web archive content to be searched alongside other formats such as books, photos, maps, periodicals and more.

This "soft launch" (or "we're putting it out there but still have improvements to make") includes content from eight of our publicly accessible web archives. We have plans for more content to be released later this year, including some archived sites not already on the LCWA site.

We've always seen public libraries as key allies in promoting personal archiving, and have highlighted libraries that undertake [outreach and training](#) in this area.

There is a related role for public libraries and allied organizations: facilitating development of community digital archives. A community collection could consist of born-digital and digitized images, audio, text or other materials.



Why Can't You Just Build it and Leave it Alone?



In the early 1990s, the [National Library of Medicine](#) experimented with arranging, describing and digitizing historical manuscript collections. The earliest experiments involved a collection containing correspondence and reports from the 1960s and 1970s. At that time, they used a proprietary document management system. Over time components were replaced and modified to meet evolving needs. Today, the metadata and digital images still survive.

What People are Asking About Personal Digital Archiving, Part 1

During Preservation Week 2013, NDIIPP hosted [a webinar about personal digital archiving](#). Over 600 people participated and, during the post-presentation question section, 91 people submitted questions online. After the webinar, [The Association for Library Collections and Technical Services](#) sent the complete list of questions. Seeing the questions helps to improve and expand our information resources.

The questions covered a variety of topics — email preservation, file naming, digital video, file migration, scanning and digital asset management — but the most striking fact is that two-thirds of all the questions could be grouped into just two main topics: digital photos and storage.
